



ages & stages of play

Snug Play is a versatile play product that allows children of different age groups to be engaged and participating in developmental play. Each age group will interact with the product entirely different than another, which means not only a new experience each time the children play with Snug, but a new type of play each year as they progress through childhood.

The chart below explains how children can use Snug Play to further develop skill sets in the 5 major learning categories.

This modular playground system works well for children in a wide range of ages. It is open ended and abstract, leading children to play at the level of development they fall within and challenge themselves to progress to new levels. As children develop and grow, their play advances and Snug Play can be appropriate at each level. Younger children (2-4) participate more on a physical level. They are learning how their bodies work by climbing, jumping and strengthening their core.

As children become older (4-7) imagination and pretend play emerge. It is during this period that storylines are acted out. They learn how to contribute and interact with others. Children who are ages 8-12 are continually testing the limits. They are learning how they can control and effect their environment and how others participate and change the dynamics of play. Children who have disabilities also follow these developmental levels, but they may not coincide with their chronological ages. Additionally, certain types of special needs hinder children's abilities to progress through these developmental levels. One example of this is children who fall within the Autism spectrum disorders have difficulty with abstract play. This includes imagination and pretend play.



Social/Emotional	Open-ended materials promote interactive, collaborative experiences that promote sense of self, conflict-resolution, and cooperation.	Independent free play promotes the development of self-esteem, independence, moral development, and the understanding of the viewpoints of others.	Responsibility for personal and social behaviors and opportunities for self- expression and understanding promote character development and friendships.
Physical	Moving, exploring, and acting on objects develop building, climbing, jumping, and running skills.	Lifting, moving through, and building promote motor planning, visual-motor coordination, and balancing skills. Sensory	Sensory-rich experiences develop understanding of the distinctive features of objects, graphic symbols/patterns, and other stimuli. Multisensory, hands-on opportunities provide ways to extend learning, promote understanding of academic concepts, and develop long-term memory skills.
Cognitive	Interactions that promote the understanding of cause-and-effect and encourage make-believe and imagination result in purposeful, goal-oriented play.	Manipulation of objects increases spatial reasoning, logic, classification, problem solving, and develops concept acquisition and the ability to symbolically represent concrete objects.	Opportunities to expand abstract thinking and apply academic concepts and knowledge occur during free, guided, and structured play.
Communication	Dramatic and constructive play provides rich language development that expands vocabulary, listening, and conversation skills.	Group experiences offer ways for children to use language in order to clearly express ideas, contribute to discussions, and follow and give directives.	Communicate effectively and learn how to influence others with expressive and receptive language.




Snug Play & Inclusion

Snug Play is an innovative playground system that promotes creative and social play. Its modular design lends itself well to inclusive play by enabling play to happen at different physical levels and allowing children to move and form the components to be optimally used. The components are large enough for many children to play together and incorporate many areas of physical, social, cognitive and sensory development.

Snug's unique design elements and social opportunities naturally fit into the philosophy of the National Lekotek Center and together can help promote inclusion of children with special needs into their family and community.

Snug Play can provide a means to inclusive play that is appropriate and effective for children who have disabilities and who are developing typically. Looking to the disability categories listed below, Snug Play can provide solutions to many of the playground issues children with disabilities may face.






























Benefits of Snug by Disability Category

Physical disabilities All the different components of Snug are accessible from the ground. They are bold shapes with no intricate parts that would be difficult to manipulate for children with limited refined movements. The components are large and durable enabling caregivers to climb and support a child as necessary without the fear of the components giving under them.

Cognitive disabilities The open-ended nature of this modular playground system provides ample opportunity to incorporate fundamental learning, memory and sequencing skills into play. The large size and number of components enhance team building and problem solving opportunities. As children construct, they are learning properties of science and math, not from book knowledge, but real experience. Gradually add different elements to a child's repertoire of play to gently guide them to challenge their bodies and minds and progress to more advanced cognitive levels.

Communicative disabilities The open-ended nature of this playground system leads to imagination and creativity. It can be used as a stage for dramatic storytelling that helps develop expressive language, conversational turn taking and sequential order. Or the pieces can be moved to create imaginative landscape to act out storylines. Moving the individual structures requires two or more children which enhances cooperation and communication.

Sensory disabilities The moveable components provide children's bodies with heavy lifting opportunities to give whole body workouts. This heavy lifting provides proprioceptive input that is known to help children better focus and attend to a cognitive task presented after. The many textures of the components help children gather input and by verbally describing the texture can help to identify the various components. The colors of the individual components are bright and bold, yet not overwhelming and busy.

Social/Emotional disabilities There is no right or wrong way to play with Snug. It invokes curiosity and exploration without impressing rules and game play. Children can experiment in an emotionally safe environment with objects they can control and position. The Snug system helps present opportunities for children to work on social and emotional skill development. As they play, children can work together to solve problems, contribute to a group and practice leadership roles.














Physical Activity
